## **Description**

Research Seminar is a dynamic weekly event for all graduate students and faculty designed to promote and enrich the Department's interdisciplinary and intellectual research culture..

### Goals

- 1. Encourage, promote and promulgate research scholarship
- 2. Increase awareness and depth of understanding of the interdisciplinary nature of research interests represented in our Department.
- 3. Build a respectful and collegial research community within the Department.
- 4. Serve as an aid to support and motivate students to keep their research projects on track
- 5. Develop presentation and research skills.
- 6. Explore and discuss commonly used quantitative and qualitative research methods

## **Formats**

The seminar takes a number of forms, which include:

- Oral research presentations by graduate students, faculty, and visitors;
- Visual research presentations by graduate students and faculty; and
- Workshops on presentation and research skills.

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# **Participation**

Graduate students and faculty are expected to participate in each research presentation seminar and to participate in workshops that will further enhance their presentation and research skills.

It is a required course for all graduate thesis students and all full-time students are expected to attend all research presentations and to select appropriate workshops.

Part-time students are expected to agree an attendance pattern with their advisor, which should ideally attend at least half the presentations each semester.

In the event that students are away from campus actively engaged in their research, it is expected as a matter of courtesy to advise their advisor and research seminar coordinator.

Faculty and graduate students from other Departments across the University may also attend when topics are of interest.

#### **Presentations**

Graduate students present twice during the completion of their degree program.

- MSc thesis full-time students are expected to give their first presentation in Semester 2 (Winter) and the second in Semester 4 (Fall).
- PhD full-time students are expected to give their first presentation in Semester 5 (Winter) and the second in Semester 7.
- Part-time thesis students should consult with their advisor on the appropriate timing of their presentations
- 1. Suggested Guidelines on the content for the first and second presentations for MSc thesis and PhD students are set out in Table 1
- 2. The topic should be developed in consultation with your graduate advisor to determine which aspects of your research or qualifying examination to cover in your presentation.
- 3. Presenters should touch base with their advisor at least one week prior to presentation to review the presentation and receive preliminary feedback. It is expected that advisors will be present at their advisees' presentations to provide support and feedback.
- 4. Participation is an important part of the seminar experience. Student and faculty participation in questions and discussion is intended to foster critical analysis of research, improve research design, data analysis and interpretation and open up possibilities that might not have been considered. Student members attending will be invited to ask the first round of questions and then faculty may join in.
- 5. Participants are encouraged to provide constructive written feedback for each presentation. Feedback might focus on the following broad areas: research project (e.g., objectives, methods, analysis, conclusions) and presentation (e.g., format, style, organization). Participants are encouraged to note the element(s) of the presentation that stood out for them, any suggestions they have for improvements, or any questions they have about the research.
