2. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides theoretical and scientific attention to the development of adolescent and emerging adults with attention to physiological, cognitive, and socioemotional development. Also, it highlights the importance of an eclectic approach to the theoretical understanding of the multiple influences on development, giving attention to bioecological influences such as the individual, family, social, and cultural contexts. Interactions between both adolescents and emerging adults and their parents and peers, in education and community contexts, and within broader cultural influences will be examined.

- 4. Critically appraise developmental theories based on developmental science and cultural diversity.
- 5. Utilize adult learning strategies such as critical reflection to challenge and/or develop perspectives pertinent to adolescents' (and emerging adults') development.
- 6. Demonstrate self-awareness regarding their own personal experience of adolescence (and emerging adulthood) and how this potentially enhances and limits their understanding of the diversity of adolescents' developmental contexts and experiences.
- 7. Demonstrate understanding of the practical application of knowledge about adolescence (and emerging adulthood) in professional contexts.

Turnitin Software:

All submitted assignments will be included as source documents in the Turnitin.com reference database solely for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of such papers. Use of the Turnitin.com service is subject to the Usage Policy posted on the Turnitin.com site.

A major benefit of using Turnitin is that students will be able to educate and empower themselves in preventing academic misconduct. In this course, you may screen your own assignments through Turnitin as many times as you wish before the due date. You will be able to see and print reports that show you exactly where you have properly and improperly referenced the outside sources and materials in your assignment.

Instructors shall not assign a grade of zero even if they believe that the student has committed some form of academic misconduct (e.g., copied material from a website like CourseHero) on an assignment or exam.

Instructors <u>can</u> determine if a student has poorly paraphrased and/or improperly cited material and can provide a grade accordingly as long as this is clearly identified as part of the assessment criteria via a rubric or other assessment tools.
