Learning Outcomes

Course Learning Outcomes

This course is designed to provide students with a greater understanding of human development across the life span from a cultural perspective. With a chronological approach, human development will focus on specific stages of life (prenatal, infancy, early childhood, school-age, adolescence, and young, middle, and late adulthood) and death. Various topical issues such as physical, cognitive, and socioemotional development will also be discussed.

By the end of this course, you should be able to:

1. Describe basic theoretical approaches to development from a cultural perspective;
2. Identify basic research methodologies and issues surrounding conducting research;
3. Describe developmental stages of growth and development across the life-span;
4. Identify developmental issues that affect parents, children, and extended family systems in varying multicultural and diverse societies; and
5. Recognize current developmental research, practices, and policies.

Assessment Descriptions

Online Tests

There will be two online non-cumulative tests, with 10 randomized questions from each chapter. The tests are to be **closed** tests which means no textbook or notes are to be used during the quiz and it must be completed individually with no assistance from others. For these tests, if you need accommodations, please directly email the instructor.

Test 1 (20%): Chapters 1 – 8, 60 questions, 80 minutes

Test 2 (30%): Chapters 9 – 15, 80 questions, 90 minutes

This course requires the use of Respondus LockDown Browser and Monitor (webcam) to proctor your online tests within CourseLink. Use of Lockdown Browser with a webcam has been implemented to maintain the academic integrity of the tests. You must [download and install](#)

Respondus LockDown Browser and Monitor Requirements

Respondus LockDown Browser is a locked browser for taking quizzes in CourseLink. It prevents you from printing and copying; using other operating software; using search engines (e.g., going to another URL); communicating via instant messaging; and it blocks non-web-related software (e.g., Adobe PDF, Microsoft Word).

Respondus Monitor is a companion application for LockDown Browser that uses webcam and video technology to ensure academic integrity during online tests. The software captures video during the test and allows the instructor to review the video once the exam is completed.

The fair dealing exemption in Canada's Copyright Act permits students to reproduce short excerpts from copyright-protected materials for purposes such as research, education, private study, criticism and review, with proper attribution. Any other copying, communicating, or distribution of any content provided in this course, except as permitted by law, may be an infringement of copyright if done without proper license or the consent of the copyright owner. Examples of infringing uses of copyrighted works would include uploading materials to a commercial third party web site, or making paper or electronic reproductions of all, or a substantial part, of works such as textbooks for commercial purposes.

Students who upload to CourseLink copyrighted materials such as book chapters, journal articles, or materials taken from the Internet, must ensure that they comply with Canadian Copyright law or with the terms of the University's electronic resource licenses.

Students should be aware that faculty have the right to use software to aid in the detection of plagiarism or copying and to examine students orally on submitted work. For students found guilty of academic misconduct, serious penalties, up to and including suspension or expulsion from the University can be imposed.

Recording of Materials

Presentations which are made in relation to course work—including lectures—cannot be recorded or copied without the permission of the presenter, whether the instructor, a classmate

or guest lecturer. Material recorded with permission is restricted to use for that course unless further permission is granted.
