This course aims to answer and explore two core questions throughout the semester:

- How aging affects an individual (in the context of their society); and
- How society is influenced by its aging individuals.

9. COURSE STATEMENTS

All components of this course will be housed on the CourseLink site including this course outline, assignments, and links to further resources. A major benefit of using Turnitin is that students will be able to educate and empower themselves in preventing academic misconduct. In this course, you may screen your own assignments through Turnitin as many times as you wish before the due date.
