This course is an examination of developmental principles and milestones characterizing infant development from conception to 24 months. Emphasis will be placed on understanding the nature of the reciprocal family-infant interactions during this period, and on the societal context influencing those interactions.

Online Quizzes:

Your assignments will be submitted through the Dropbox function. Marks and feedback will also be released on the site. Late Assignments:

All deadlines (Discussion Posts, Part A and B; Online Quizzes; Written Paper) have a grace period of 48 hours. This means that marks will not be docked if you submit before the extra 48 hours period expires. Please, do not treat the grace period as the deadline, because it is not. The deadline is a hard deadline and the grace period is in place to account for potential difficulties and life events that can occur at the time of the hard deadline. Emails asking for late submission during the grace period are not needed and will not be answered: just submit within the grace period.

CourseLink is set up to reflect the grace period so that the section does not have to be continually manually reopened each time a student needs to submit within this additional 48 hours. That is why the due date listed in assignment descriptions and on the course outline shows as two days earlier than what is posted on CourseLink.

No extensions over the grace period will be given. You can submit the assignment after the grace period has expired; however, your mark will be docked 10% per day including weekends EXCEPT under exceptional documented grounds for compassionate consideration. Assignments submitted more than one week late without documented grounds will receive a grade of zero. If you are going to hand an assignment in late, you must contact your course instructor in advance of the due date to inform them when you will be submitting your assignment. This policy is in place to guarantee fairness for all students.

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Receipt of Grades:

After you receive a grade on CourseLink, please review your feedback. Any inquiry or dispute over the grade must be made within two weeks from the date they are posted. If you fail to protest any grade during this time limit, changes to the grade will not be considered. Grades will be based on the Grading Procedures outlined in the Undergraduate Calendar.

Turnitin Software:

In this course, your instructor will be using Turnitin, integrated with the CourseLink Dropbox tool, to detect possible plagiarism, unauthorized collaboration or copying as part of the ongoing efforts to maintain academic integrity at the University of Guelph.

All submitted assignments will be included as source documents in the Turnitin.com reference database solely for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of such papers. Use of the Turnitin.com service is subject to the Usage Policy posted on the Turnitin.com site.

A major benefit of using Turnitin is that students will be able to educate and empower themselves in preventing academic misconduct. In this course, you may screen your own assignments through Turnitin as many times as you wish before the due date. You will be able to see and print reports that show you exactly where you have properly and improperly referenced the outside sources and materials in your assignment.
